

Nadie Es Profeta En Su Tierra

Tantas veces juzgamos a otros por su origen de nacimiento, por el color de su piel, por cuanta educación tienen, por el dinero en su bolsillo, por la ropa que llevan puesta..., y los juzgamos casi inmediatamente al encontrarlos. No esperamos para conversar más con ellos para que conozcamos sus pensamientos, sentimientos, sueños, convicciones, amistades, espiritualidad... Jesús fue del pueblo de Nazaret, y la gente pensó que nadie famoso o importante pudiera venir de Nazaret. No iban a aceptar a Él y su mensaje, porque habían conocido a Él desde su niñez, y cómo iban a aceptar lo que ese joven iba a decirles.

Muchas veces son los que no conocen por mucho tiempo a una persona, que son más abiertos a escuchar las ideas de esa persona. Puede ser que en nuestro trabajo otros no nos aceptan o no aceptan nuestras ideas y sugerencias. "¿Cómo? ¿Algo nuevo? ¿Cómo puede él o ella dar una sugerencia de otra manera de hacer esto? Nunca hemos hecho esto antes. Siempre lo hemos hecho así, pero no de esa manera...."

Aunque la gente estaba rechazando lo que Jesús estaba diciendo (lo llevaron hasta un barranco del monte para despeñarlo en vez de escucharle"), Jesús no dejó de predicar la Palabra de Dios. Para nosotros, no debemos dejar de instruir, de compartir los mandamientos y los criterios de Dios con nuestros hijos, aunque a veces no les guste y les entren ganas de que nos esfumemos.

Ser profeta es predicar con la palabra y el ejemplo los valores cristianos, que no son los valores del mundo. Eso fue dificil para Jesucristo y también para nosotros. A veces otras personas se ríen de los que están intentando vivir la vida cristiana, pero tenemos que hacer fielmente lo que predicamos. Puede ser que asistamos la Misa todos los domingos, o tengamos un rosario al cuello o una casa llena de imágenes de santos o un altarcito a la Virgen María, pero no somos comprensivos y serviciales con nuestro(a) esposo(a), con nuestros hijos, con los de mayor edad, o con nuestros compañeros de trabajo o de la escuela, o con las más necesitados, o no sabemos sacrificarnos, o no somos justos en nuestros tratos. No vale tener los externos de la religión, si no vivimos lo que Jesús había predicado y hacía en su propia vida

Puede ser que es más fácil actuar como un cristiano cuando

uno está con desconocidos que con conocidos. Los conocidos ya han decidido cómo somos y están listos a juzgar y criticarnos y sugerir motivos falsos por nuestras acciones buenas. FAMILY MINISTRY

Jesus' statement that no prophet is accepted in his home town reminds us that it is often difficult to hear a Challenging message from those who know us best, even if it is true. Perhaps we remember and even regret this aspect of our childhood and adolescence. We may have overlooked the wisdom and guidance of our parents, while allowing the voices of others—teachers, friends, and counselors—to Carry more weight, even when these people were telling us the same thing. Perhaps this developmental stage is unavoidable. Perhaps as we have matured, we have come to a new appreciation for our parents and others whose perspective and experience we once rejected. Today's Gospel provides an opportunity to talk about and to learn from such experiences.

As you gather as a family, consider proverbs or other wise sayings that are familiar to your family ("Blood is thicker than water;" "All that glitters is not gold."). Consider what these proverbs mean and whether you believe them to be true. Why or why not? Jesus challenges the people of Nazareth by reminding them of old sayings that seem to have a lot of truth in them. Let's listen to this Gospel and consider what these proverbs mean. Read aloud today's Gospel, Luke 4:21-30. Ask: **What were the proverbs that Jesus** quoted? (Physician, cure yourself; No prophet is accepted in his native place.) Consider the meaning of these proverbs and look for examples from your own family life that show their truth. Consider how your family might accept one another's wisdom and guidance and not reject the prophets in your midst. Conclude by praying together the Prayer to the Holy Spirit. FMMILY
