

Catholics Speak Out for Justice: Equal Rights for Farmworkers

This weekend you'll have the opportunity to sign our diocese-wide Public Policy Weekend petition in support of farmworkers. It will read: The labor of tens of thousands of farmworkers brings food to our tables. However, New York State labor law categorically denies farmworkers basic rights and protections enjoyed by virtually all other workers. These exclusions mean that unlike other workers, farmworkers do not have the right to: a guaranteed day of rest per week; overtime pay; employer contributions to disability insurance; public health protections including sanitation and housing standards; or protections while bargaining collectively.

Farming is a vital part of New Your State economy. Economic policies that protect family farms are essential. We urge the legislature to support New York State farmers along with farmworkers. We believe that the sacred human dignity of every man, woman, and child, without exception, should e respected and that the basic rights of all workers should be recognized. Therefore, we urge the New York State Assembly, Senate and Governor Cuomo to support the Farmworkers Fair Labor Practice Act ending the exclusion of farmworkers from basic rights and granting them equal treatment under our labor laws.

La riqueza material puede llegar a ser un obstáculo si sea el lugar central en nuestro corazón. El corazón debe estar ocupado por Dios. ¿Para quién es la felicidad del Reino de Dios?

Los pobres, los que pasan hambre, los que lloran, los que son odiados y perseguidos injustamente son los que se fían de la ayuda de Señor y encuentran en Dios su seguridad. Ay de otros que se ríen por la riqueza que gozan ahora; algún día llorarán.

corazón tuyo se ablande y dejes a Dios entrarlo y conquistarlo.


FAMILY MINISTRY

Today's Gospel offers a contrast to many of the messages we hear in our society today. If we were to accept uncritically the "get ahead" messages of our culture, we would think that happiness means having money, being successful, and having many possessions. In this way, we are not unlike the people who heard Jesus teach on the day that he taught the Beatitudes. They too associated happiness with possessions and success. The report of the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel, however, takes things one step further. Not only will we not find happiness through the "get ahead" messages of the world, but relying upon these messages will cause us harm. The warnings spoken are particularly challenging because they suggest that our way of life must change if we are to gain the lasting happiness of eternal life.

Talk together as a family about what society tells us makes a person successful. Make a list of the traits that you associate with a successful person. Then read together today's Gospel, Luke 6:17,20-26. Reflect on Jesus' description of blessedness in the Kingdom of God. Then consider the warnings. Why are these surprising and challenging? What, then, is the measure of success in the Kingdom of God? Together write prayers of petition based on your discussion. Pray these prayers together, asking God to help your family seek the blessings of the Kingdom of God.
