I am just learning myself about the ministries of our parish. We have our Giving Tree for Christmas. There's the Martha Ministries, Altar & Rosary Society, and the volunteers who take care of our gardens just to name a few others.

At the bottom of this page you will find parish statistics ranging from number of attendees to number of funerals. The financial numbers tell how we are doing at paying our bills. The rest of what is in this report speaks about how we are serving God and our community.

Financially you can see we ended the year with a slight surplus in the *operating* budget. I stress *operating* because on top of that \$31,362 was spent on long-term building improvements that came out of our savings. Please see page two for more about this.

You can also see that for next year we are forecasting a budget with a deficit of about \$9,500. The reason for the deficit is simple, inflation. Everything costs more. In the budget for 2016-2017 we projected for our Sunday collection to remain the same. We greatly appreciate your contributions to our collections in whatever amount you can give. Giving to the CMA also helps our budget because we must make up any shortfall. I do ask that you pray about your ability to contribute not just financially but of your time, talent, and treasure. If you are able to give more, it will be greatly appreciated. It is with your help that we serve the people of God.

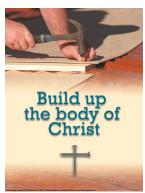

Jail Ministry

In this Jubilee Year of Mercy, we must not forget that one of the Corporal Works of Mercy is to "Visit the Imprisoned." Sometimes we think the people in prison deserve what they get. Sometimes they are simply forgotten. There are consequences to our bad actions but Jesus offers everyone the chance to repent. We need to offer them God's love and to let them know forgiveness is possible when one turns their heart to Christ.



We are blessed to have an active Jail Ministry in our parish. These volunteers go to the county prison once a week in the evening to offer outreach and spiritual support through music, prayer, scripture, and faith stories to the inmates. Currently we have just three male volunteers so we are only able to offer this ministry to male inmates. More male volunteers would mean you only need to volunteer every couple of weeks.

Status of Our Buildings and Grounds, and Reserves



We are blessed to have a beautiful church on the outside and the inside. This has not always been the case. In recent years we have been blessed with the means to address many of our needed repairs and blessed with volunteers who take care of the flowers and shrubs. Thank you to those who volunteer with this.

This year, recognizing that many parish properties have not been well taken care of, our diocese directed that all parishes should have a Building and Grounds group that serves as a subcommittee of the Finance Council. The Financial Council is responsible for advising the pastor on the management of the assets of the parish. This includes the buildings and grounds but the Finance Council doesn't always have the needed expertise here. So we have formed our new subcommittee that includes Bob Havrilla, an engineer, Ed VanQuekelberg, a carpenter, and Peter Staples, a safety expert. This group has reviewed all our properties and some items that needed immediate attention were completed this summer. Fortunately, because of the work that has been completed in recent years, we did not need a lot of urgent repairs. Next, we will begin developing a five year plan to be proactive about our building and grounds needs instead of waiting till there is a problem. We thank these people for agreeing to help us with this important work.

To give you an idea of how much has been done in recent years, here is the total spent on capital repairs. The money from this has come from our savings. We are also including our savings and investment balances here to let you know how we are going there.

You can see on page two that we have been relying on our savings to cover our capital expenses. It has been a while since we have had added any significant amount to our reserves. Generally this comes from wills and trusts. This type of giving is called "Planned Giving". The most common form of this type of giving is from Wills. These types of gifts can be small or large. More commonly we receive gifts from wills ranging from \$100 to \$1,000 but can be much larger. Whatever the amount, the generosity is appreciated. Other types of planned giving include trusts, annuities, and insurance. The concept of Planned Giving acknowledges that while we might like to give more now, we need to take care of our own bills. Each in their own way, all types of Planned Giving are designed to allow you to take care of your own needs now while allowing the church to benefit when you no longer need the funds.
